### **If you phone us we will:**

- resolve your enquiry as quickly as possible.
- provide voicemail if the person you need is unavailable.
- answer your phone message within three working days.

- reply to your letter or email within 10 working days.

### **If we write to you we will:**

- write in plain language.
- arrange for translation, large type, braille or audio tapes upon request.

## New nesting platform for ‘majestic bird of prey’

Our Awarded Watercourses team have helped Milton Country Park Ranger Geoff Gilfillan install an Osprey nesting platform at the park. Geoff said: “We hope this nest will attract breeding Ospreys into Cambridgeshire for the first time since they originally went extinct in the UK in the early 1900s.”

For seven weeks last autumn, Milton Country Park was home to an Osprey, interesting and exciting the park’s visitors. Geoff continued: “There are two large lakes at Milton Country Park - stocked with a range of fish species that form the diet of Ospreys. Across those seven weeks last year, ‘our’ Osprey was observed feeding on these fish regularly.

Therefore, we know the lakes at Milton Country Park form a suitable habitat. Now we have installed a nesting platform fixed on top of a telegraph pole, we hope there is also now a suitable breeding area in the park for this majestic bird of prey.”

## Swim safely this summer

As the warm, sunny weather arrives in time for the school holidays and the temptation to jump into rivers and lakes to cool off increases, adults are being urged to remind young people of the dangers of swimming in open water.

Risks include cold water shock, hazards including trolleys or rubble below the surface that can trap or injure, undercurrents, and also young people overestimating their ability while with their friends.

## Four-day week update

Thank you to the hundreds of residents who took part in our four-day week consultation at the start of the year. The consultation allowed people to give us more feedback and share their views on our services during a trial of a four-day week. In total, more than 1,600 responses were received.

Those responses are now being analysed independently by a data analysis company, who will then produce a report on their findings. Information from the consultation will help our District

Councillors decide on the next steps for the four-day week at the Council.

A report on consultation feedback, along with other data such as our performance information, will be published on our website so it can be discussed at our Full Council meeting on 17 July when it is expected a decision will be made.

## Your Council: How we spend your Council Tax

On this page, we outline how we're funded and what we spend money on.

We collect Council Tax on behalf of the Police, Fire Service, County Council, the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority and parish councils. Only around 7.5% of your annual Council Tax bill goes towards services which we provide – like emptying bins, determining planning applications and homelessness support.

Our waste and planning budgets include the funding to provide these services in Cambridge too as we share both services with the City Council. Council housing rent is not included in this page's figures; this is kept in a separate account and can only be spent on improvements to our Council homes and building new ones.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Resources, Cllr John Williams, said: "You'll see our Council logo at the top of your Council Tax bill, but it's important to know that we only keep a small share of it. Most of the money is passed on to support other local government services and emergency services. For an average Band D property, just £175.40 a year goes directly to us - funding essential local services like bin collections, environmental health, housing support, benefits administration, and planning.

As central government funding continues to decline—with another reduction this year—we remain committed to finding new, innovative ways to generate income. Our priority is to protect and maintain the frontline services that matter most to our residents."

### Where our money comes from

We charge one of the lowest Council Taxes in the country to provide a range of services to residents and businesses. However, Council Tax is only one element of the funding we receive. Our budget for the year is made up of money from different sources. Here's how we get our funding of £86.48 million for the current financial year:

Grant from Government: £0.48 million

New Homes Bonus: £1.88 million

Income from investments: £7.83 million

Council Tax: £12.26 million

Business Rates: £18.33 million

Grants, fees, charges and other: £45.7 million

### What we spend our funding totalling £86.48 million on:

Waste and recycling: £21.81 million

Housing benefits, Council Tax and Business rates: £17.48 million

Other Corporate charges and Contributions: £13.61 million

Planning services: £13.05 million

Transformation, people and corporate services: £6.04 million

Housing services: £5.98 million

Climate and environment: £3.36 million

Corporate management and elections: £2.57 million

Finance services: £1.46 million



Economic development and commercial investment: £0.94 million

Legal services: £0.18 million

## **Your Council: Introducing our new website**

Our new website is now live - and we've introduced a new and improved look and feel to simplify accessing our online services. You can now view personalised information in real-time including:

### **Other features include:**

- **Streamlined navigation:** A clear and intuitive layout that makes it easier for you to find essential services.
- **Improved user experience:** All website content has been rewritten so you can efficiently self-serve, reducing the need for in-person visits. We have also recently added SAM (Service Assistant Module), an AI chatbot who will answer your questions 24/7.
- **Reduced reading age:** As our content has been re-written, our reading age has dropped. This means that our content can be understood by an eleven-year old as we have used plain English and broken down technical terms (where we can) throughout the website.
- **Accessibility features:** The site has been designed to meet web content accessibility guidelines, ensuring everyone can easily access content.
- **Improved carbon efficiency:** As part of our 'Being green to our core' Corporate Plan priority, the latest website boasts a higher carbon efficiency rating due to the improved design, the reduction of files and revised content.

Cllr Brian Milnes, Deputy Leader and Lead Cabinet Member for Environment said:

"We are very pleased to launch this new website, which marks an important milestone in our ongoing efforts to improve how we connect with and serve the residents of South Cambridgeshire.

The way we now present local information that is personalised based on your postcode is a real game changer. It makes it so much easier to see what is happening on your doorstep - showing nearby planning applications, bin days, local events and more at a glance. Please do have a look and share your thoughts as we welcome regular feedback, so we can make as many improvements as possible."

The launch of the website is part of a wider goal to enhance digital services and ensure that we remain responsive and accessible in an increasingly digital world. The website was developed with input from local residents who tested the layout to ensure our new website is easy to navigate.

## Your Council: Update on local government reorganisation

Local government reorganisation involves significant changes to the structure, responsibilities, and boundaries of local councils in England.

### What's changing?

A Government White Paper on English Devolution, published in December 2024, proposes reorganising 'two-tier' areas like Cambridgeshire, which currently have both district and county councils.

In Cambridgeshire, the County Council provides county-wide services such as education, road maintenance, and adult social care, while district councils like us handle local services like rubbish collection, planning, homelessness support, and environmental health. The Government wants to replace these two layers with a single tier.

Parish and town councils, which are smaller and have different local responsibilities, are not currently being asked to change.

### Why the change?

The reorganisation is intended to bring services together, potentially leading to improvements and making it simpler for residents to know who to contact. Financial savings are also expected by reducing the number of councils.

Our Council Leader, Cllr Bridget Smith, said:

"We are approaching local government reorganisation with an open mind and a spirit of wanting the best for all our residents and for the local area as a whole. Not all of us would have chosen this path, but we accept that it is the path we are on and realise it is important that we collaborate to control our own destiny.

We look forward to further discussions with other councils in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, and with Government, residents, Members of Parliament and our partners including the police, NHS, fire service and town and parish councils."

### What's next?

Council leaders in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough continue to discuss proposals, though no single option has been agreed upon yet. The Government also allows councils to submit their own proposals, and all councils were asked to provide an initial response by 21 March 2025, with a final business plan due by November this year.

An Extraordinary Full Council meeting was held on 19 March to discuss our initial response, followed by a Cabinet meeting to approve it formally.

Our response letter, which was also agreed by five other councils in Cambridgeshire, outlined how further work is taking place to reach a shared understanding of how best to progress the proposals. The scenarios being considered are taking account of historic community identities, the interests of residents, economic geographies, and local demographic representation.

## Communities: Reviving the heart of Ickleton

The Ickleton community have come together to re-open a beloved pub that had been a feature of the village for hundreds of years.

The Ickleton Lion closed its doors on 1 July 2023, which marked the end of an era for the village of Ickleton. For over 300 years, it had been a vital social hub. Its closure left a noticeable gap, but the community was not ready to say goodbye.

Fortunately, the Parish Council had the foresight in 2014 to register the pub as an Asset of



Community Value, and when the pub went up for sale, a six-month moratorium gave residents time to form a Community Benefit Society (CBS), raise funds, and purchase the pub in December 2024 with support from 415 local shareholders.

The CBS also secured grants from us - £22,258 from our Net Zero Villages fund to improve energy efficiency for the building plus £1,844 from our Community Chest Grant to help revamp the garden, focusing on biodiversity.

Community fundraising events brought people together to discuss their vision for the pub - sharing evening meals, coffee mornings and quizzes to raise another £12,000.

Lizzie, a member of the CBS, said: "The events brought people together and forged new friendships."

With over 70 volunteers involved, the Ickleton Lion is being reborn - not just as a pub, but as a vibrant community space, shaped by the people it serves.

## **Communities: Mobile Food Hub continues delivering food and hope**

The Mobile Food Hub, coordinated by Hope Against Poverty Community Interest Company (CIC), visits six villages in South Cambridgeshire every week.

Fresh produce and essential items – some of which are free and everything else at below retail price – are brought directly to villages around the district to help residents with rising food prices. It also helps to tackle food waste, redistributing food from supermarkets and farms that would have ended up in the bin.

Last year, Hope CIC were awarded £15,000 towards the purchase of an electric vehicle through our Zero Carbon Community Grant. The van stocks food such as fruit and vegetables, bread, cereal, drinks, canned foods, pasta and rice. Household cleaning, hygiene, menstrual and baby/infant products can also be purchased subject to what is available on the day.

Anyone can access the Mobile Food Hub and no voucher or referral is needed.

Cllr Henry Batchelor, our Lead Cabinet Member for Communities, said: "The Mobile Food Hub not only provides affordable food and essentials to those who need it most, it also helps prevent fresh food going to waste. By shopping at the Mobile Food Hub you are saving perfectly good food being thrown away, as well as helping to fund Hope CIC's other projects."

100,000 library members across Cambridgeshire turn to the library for books, computers and WiFi, lifelong learning, social activities and more. Here's why they think libraries are so important.

Cambridgeshire County Council runs 33 libraries across the county – 10 are in South Cambridgeshire: Bar Hill, Cambourne, Comberton, Cottenham, Great Shelford, Histon, Linton, Papworth, Sawston and Willingham.

South Cambridgeshire also has five Community Managed Libraries (run by volunteers), in Bassingbourn, Fulbourn, Gamlingay, Melbourn and Waterbeach.

A Mobile Library visits villages around the district usually monthly, on the same day and time each month. While Cambourne Library is closed for refurbishment, there are extended hours at Comberton and Papworth Libraries.

## **Communities: Supporting independence**

Mobile and Community Warden schemes form key parts of the communities that they serve.

Mobile and Community Warden Schemes (also known as Community Care Schemes) are vital in supporting older and vulnerable residents across South Cambridgeshire. These schemes help people stay independent in their own homes by providing regular contact, reducing isolation, and helping to prevent unnecessary hospital admissions.

An independent review has shown that for every £1 invested in these schemes, £4.92 of social value is generated. This includes reducing the demand on adult social care services, supporting quicker hospital discharges, and providing essential social interaction.

### **Information for families and potential clients**

For families, these schemes offer peace of mind that their loved ones are supported by a trusted and reliable service. For a relatively low weekly charge, clients receive regular visits or calls, help with day-to-day matters, and companionship.

### **Examples of support provided\*:**

- Friendship and emotional support to combat loneliness and for improved mental wellbeing

- Helping with errands like picking up prescriptions or going to the Post Office
  - Help with shopping, reading post, filling in forms and making phone calls
  - Reminders to take medication
- \* services may vary slightly, depending on the scheme

Cllr Henry Batchelor, our Lead Cabinet Member for Communities, said: “If you or someone you care for could benefit from extra help to stay independent and connected, I encourage you to find out more about our Mobile and Community Warden schemes. Details about the support they offer and areas they cover are available on our website.

### **Funding and support to set up a new scheme**

We play a key role in funding Mobile and Community Warden Schemes. In 2024-25, we allocated £100,000 to support both the ongoing operation of existing schemes and the development of new ones across the district.

We’ve also recently introduced a 10-year tapered grant model to help schemes become financially sustainable over time while maintaining high levels of support. As part of this, £135,000 has been allocated for the financial year 2025–26, and included in this £12,000 has been ring fenced for the setup of new schemes and the expansion of existing schemes which is particular benefit in our rural or underserved areas.

A dedicated toolkit is available to guide new groups through the setup process.

## **Planning: Young minds help shape future public art in Sawston**

30 students from year five at Icknield Primary School, Sawston, recently took part in our latest Greater Cambridge Shared Planning youth engagement workshop.

The students got the chance to unleash their creativity and share their ideas for a proposed public art feature at Accelerator Park, Dales Manor Business Park, which is near their school. The aluminium panel artwork will sit in front of the new research and development and office building which opens this summer.

The workshops, co-designed by our Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Youth Engagement Service team, Icknield Primary School and the developer Canmoor’s design team, were also attended by representatives from Hale Architects, Canmoor developers, commissioned artist Charley Peters and Cllr Dr. Tumi Hawkins, our Lead Cabinet Member for Planning.

The workshop took place in two parts, starting with a tour of where the new building is being constructed. Charley Peters accompanied the pupils, speaking about how the nearby local features and the input of local residents will provide inspiration for her panels’ artwork.

After this, the students attended a workshop to learn about the basics of placemaking and contributed their ideas for the proposed art. These design ideas will be incorporated in the artwork to ensure that they have a genuine input. Prizes were awarded to those who came up with the most creative designs.

As well as developing planning and design skills through walkabout site tours and fun workshops, the students also learned about the different career options within the built environment such as urban design, town planning, land and property development, construction and art.

Cllr Dr. Tumi Hawkins said: “This initiative is a fantastic example of how meaningful youth engagement can shape the future of our communities. It not only meets the requirements of our Local Plan and the Greater Cambridge Statement of Community Involvement but also aligns

with the National Planning Policy Framework by giving young people a real voice in shaping their environment. Involving local students in the design of public art helps build a stronger connection between new developments and the communities they serve.

## **Planning: Securing nature amongst new housing**

When developers apply for planning permission, local councils like us work closely with them to ensure that new housing proposals include attractive green spaces, trees and planting beds, play areas and other features that benefit both communities and wildlife.

However, new research from the University of Sheffield and campaign group Wild Justice, shows that some housing developers are failing wildlife and communities on a “systemic and widespread scale” as they often do not deliver what is promised in their planning agreements.

### **Findings from the Lost Nature report**

- Some housing developers install just half of the ecological features that they should
- 39% of the trees promised in planting plans within planning applications were missing or dead
- Nearly half of the native hedges that were supposed to be laid did not exist

### **Holding developers accountable**

Some housing developers working in South Cambridgeshire are also sadly not keeping their legally binding planning agreements and landscape and ecology commitments. Our Greater Cambridge Shared Planning service has therefore created a new procedure for the monitoring and enforcement of delivery of landscapes within new build housing schemes, making a positive impact.

### **Achieving improvements**

Our Landscape team have inspected over 50 sites since 2023 to check the tree and shrub planting, play areas, footpaths and other green spaces in new developments in South Cambridgeshire. Most visits require a written report to instruct the developer on the works needed to fix the problems on site.

The program of inspections and reporting has been very successful. Once developers receive our report, many start working with us to make improvements and meet their planning obligations. We are proactively working with developers on 35 sites to deliver sustainable spaces for people and nature.

We have now achieved positive outcomes for 16 sites, where developers have made significant progress and completed the remedial works highlighted by our team. A follow up visit after 12 months revealed these landscapes were still well-maintained.

On sites where developers have failed to respond or complete the remedial work, we have involved our Planning Compliance team. So far, nine problem sites are facing enforcement and legal action.

## **Recycling and waste: Keeping your communities clean and free of litter**

We use a zonal street cleaning system, which means we divide the district into five zones.

Each zone has a dedicated team of two operatives and two vans. They follow a regular schedule for street cleaning and for emptying community litter and dog waste bins in each zone.

Alternatively, the new localisation feature on our website provides you with the upcoming dates of the sweeper, and the day bins are emptied. Simply type your post code in on the home page.

### **Identifying our litter and dog waste bins**

Currently, all litter and dog waste bins that we are responsible for will display a sticker containing our phone number and the Council logo.

We are in the process of replacing these old stickers with an updated version that has a QR code. This QR code will take you straight to our website to report the bin if it is full and needs to be emptied, but also provides a phone number for those without a smartphone.

The sticker shows that we are responsible for emptying those bins. If a bin does not have this sticker, it is serviced by a different organisation.

For bins that we do not service, we recommend contacting your Parish Council to check who is responsible for emptying it.

If the bin is in a new housing development, it is likely that the management company for that development is responsible for emptying it.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Environmental Services and Licensing, Cllr Natalie Warren- Green, says: "The new sticker will make it easier for residents to identify bins we are responsible for and if there is an issue, they can report it by simply scanning the QR code. Be sure to check out the new localisation feature on our new website too. It's extremely helpful and informs you which bins are being emptied every week, and when the road sweeper is next due."

You can also report an overflowing bin and request a new litter or dog waste bin via our website.

## **Recycling and waste: Let's waste less**

A new campaign featuring residents and staff showcases best practice for recycling and preventing waste.

When you are rinsing out a baked bean tin or breaking down cardboard boxes to fit in your blue bin, do you ever wonder whether your efforts are worthwhile or if anyone else in your community bothers?

We don't tend to have conversations with friends or neighbours about the fact that we rinse our jam jars, and we don't see what other people do or don't put in their bins, so it's easy to feel that we're acting alone.

We wanted to shine a light on these good recycling habits and on those that reduce waste too, so we asked residents to share what they do to waste less. As part of the campaign, residents volunteered to be featured on the side of nine of our new bin lorries to take their messages all around the district.

Our crews are also important ambassadors for recycling, so we were delighted that they also wanted to share their tips to help residents make the most of the service.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Environmental Services and Licensing, Cllr Natalie Warren- Green said: "We want to celebrate the collective actions that hundreds of thousands of residents make every day that help to reduce the amount of resources that end up in landfill. Whether it's avoiding waste by repairing or choosing pre-loved products, or by ensuring only clean and correct items are put in recycling bins, more and more of us are doing our bit. Let's waste less and let's do it together.

Some of the residents who took part are Recycling Champions. These are volunteers who help



communicate about recycling and reducing waste, for example by speaking to people at events. They get involved as much or as little as they like and receive a regular newsletter. ## **Housing: Extra Cambs HIA support to improve homes**

An updated and improved Adaptations and Repairs Policy will help meet the needs of more disabled people.

We are delighted to share that our partners Cambs Home Improvement Agency (Cambs HIA) will now be able to meet the needs of more people with disabilities as a result of an updated and improved Adaptations and Repairs Policy which was approved by our Cabinet in March.

Cambs HIA is a strategic partnership which has been operating across Cambridge City, Huntingdonshire, and South Cambridgeshire for 13 years. Their primary role is to work collaboratively with Occupational Therapists to design and support adaptations that enable people with long term health conditions to safely and, as independently as possible, remain in their own home.

### **Under our new policy, the main changes are:**

- Increasing the amount available to an individual as a top up grant or loan from £15,000 to £30,000. The maximum available under a Disabled Facility Grant is £30,000, so for those with complex needs, this will increase the amount available to meet a person's assessed needs to a maximum of £60,000.
- Increasing the amount available for repairs grants or loans to low-income homeowners. This will increase from £10,000 to £15,000 enabling residents, with the support of Cambs HIA, to be able to make their homes more energy efficient and improve any major disrepair. For homes which are assessed as failing the Housing health and safety rating system, this sum will increase to up to £25,000.
- Supporting those who need to selffund adaptations to their homes in a comparable way to those eligible for the grants in recognition of the needs that people face irrespective of tenure.

These improvements have been made possible due to a Government increase in the Disabled Facility Grant budgets. Separately, we also fund a further £875,000 for adaptations for Council tenants and whilst all funding is subject to available budget, we hope greater flexibility will also help reduce delays.

Cambs HIA gave us an example of a young disabled man who required a raft of adaptations including a level access shower, hoists, ramps and wash dry toilets to enable him to remain living at home with his parents rather than in residential care. The Agency reported that these types of adaptations were being delayed because the maximum grant of £30,000 was not enough to cover the equipment and construction costs and that those on low incomes were unable to afford to pay the difference. Adaptations can be life changing for families and mean that hospital and social care budgets are saved for where no alternative exists.

## Housing: Adding bird and bat boxes to Council homes

As part of our ongoing commitment to improve sustainability and preserve wildlife habitats, we launched a project to install bird and bat boxes on our Council homes.

Initially these will be installed on homes that are undergoing re-roofing works, and are only being installed with the tenant's permission, but will be extending this to other homes too so that any tenant who requests it may be added to the project, where appropriate.

We secured £5,000 in funding through our Green to Our Core internal fund, which was set up to encourage Council colleagues to develop projects that reduce carbon emissions or enhance biodiversity - both within Council offices and across the wider district. The project began in late 2024, and we aim to continue it throughout 2025.

The hope is that these bird and bat boxes will encourage wildlife and replace nesting habitats that are being lost in some areas due to modern building methods. This is part of our vision to double nature in South Cambridgeshire by 2050 and, in so doing, enable wildlife and people to thrive.

## Housing: Building more Council homes

The 2024/25 year was an incredibly productive and exciting time for our New Build Council housing team. Here's a look at some of our key achievements and ongoing work:

### Key highlights:

- **85 new homes delivered**

We successfully delivered and handed over 85 new Council homes for affordable rent or shared ownership. These homes are now ready for residents across various towns and villages throughout the district.

- **Over 100 homes in progress**

Construction is well underway on more than 100 new Council homes, all scheduled for completion within the next 12 to 15 months.

- **Contracts signed for 71 more homes**

We've signed contracts to deliver an additional 71 new Council homes, ensuring a steady pipeline of high-quality housing.

- **Planning for the future: 270 more homes**

We've submitted bids and started contract negotiations with multiple developers to bring forward 270 more new Council homes in the coming years.

### Building for a greener future

All our new homes are designed with energy efficiency in mind. Wherever possible, we are incorporating modern, sustainable features such as:

- Air source heat pumps
- Electric vehicle charging points
- Photovoltaic (solar) panels

These technologies help lower energy bills for residents and support our commitment to a greener future.

## **Housing: Council tenants elect new representatives**

The Regulator of Social Housing has created a new system for looking at how well social housing landlords in England are doing at providing good quality homes and services. In 2020, the Government published the charter for social housing residents: the Social Housing White Paper, which sets out ways to improve conditions for people living in social housing. One of the aims of the White Paper is to have tenants’ voices heard by their landlord; through regular meetings, scrutiny panels or being on its board.

Here at South Cambridgeshire District Council, we have a Housing Engagement Board that comprises six tenant representatives, one residential leaseholder, three councillors and our Head of Housing. The board was set up in 2021 with elected tenants serving a four-year term. We have recently held elections to appoint a new board of tenant and residential leaseholder representatives for the next four years.

### **Our new tenant board members are:**

- North tenant representatives: Margaret Wilson & Jim Watson
- East tenant representatives: Amy Stock & Vivienne Till
- West tenant representatives: Laura Nelson & Michael Luffman
- Residential leaseholder representative: Patti Hall

The role of the Housing Engagement Board is to discuss, scrutinise, and recommend how their housing service is managed, and how well it performs for tenants and residential leaseholders. They help us focus on tenants’ priorities, make sure that their rent and service charges are being well spent, Council homes are maintained to a high standard, and neighbourhoods are safe and a nice place to live.

Cllr John Batchelor Lead Cabinet Member for Housing and Chair of the board, says: “It’s encouraging to see a growing interest from tenants in getting involved to enhance their housing service. This year, more tenants stood for election, and we’re excited to collaborate with the newly elected representatives in the years ahead.

As well as the Housing Engagement Board, we have tenant panels that any Council tenant can be involved with. Our Policy Review panel help to review our housing policies and procedures. We have a Tenant Satisfaction Measures and Performance Review panel that looks at the performance of our housing service and ways we can make improvements. There is also a Contract Review panel that monitors our contracts to make sure they are performing as they should as well as participating in the awarding of new contracts.

Estate inspections are another way tenants can get involved by going out to estates in our villages along with other tenant inspectors and our housing officers to look at and report any issues in the area.

## Housing: Preventing homelessness and providing housing advice

During the 2023/24 financial year, on average we prevented 79 cases of homelessness each quarter. This has increased during the following 12 months, with an average of 93 cases per quarter.

If you are at risk of becoming homeless or are worried about your housing situation, it is important to act as soon as possible. We want to be able to help you to resolve any risk you feel you may have in relation to your housing.

- Are you worried about your tenancy or being able to afford your rent?
- Are you living with family or friends but worried they may ask you to leave?
- Are you feeling at risk from someone that you live with?
- Do you need help to resolve problems so you can stay in your current home or assistance to find somewhere else to live?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, or you are worried about losing your home for any other reason, please get in touch.

The sooner you contact us, the sooner we can help and the more chance we can help you to prevent homelessness and give you advice on the options available to you.

We are also proud that we have received accreditation from the Domestic Abuse Housing Alliance and can provide a trauma informed response to survivors of domestic abuse.

### Income Maximisation Service

As well as housing advice, we have colleagues who can help to maximise your income, give you budgeting advice, assess affordability and signpost or refer you to specialist services.

- Are you struggling to manage your housing and other essential costs?
- Are you unable to repay your debts?
- Do you need advice on what financial help you may be entitled to?

We offer personalised support, tailored to meet the needs of the individual. We can provide advice on:

- Budgeting
- Reducing household expenses
- Benefit entitlement
- Preventing homelessness due to arrears

We have also developed a training package for new tenants. This will cover your responsibilities as a tenant along with details of the costs you are likely to have and where to seek help if you need it.

## Housing: Continuing to support Ukrainians in South Cambridgeshire

The Homes for Ukraine scheme began in March 2022. Since then, South Cambridgeshire has welcomed 961 Ukrainians, more than any other District Council area.

The kindness of people hosting Ukrainians in their homes has made the scheme a great success. We are incredibly thankful for their ongoing support. Local community groups also played a huge part in providing a warm welcome, and helping Ukrainians feel a part of the local community.

We have provided a range of support for Ukrainians to help them integrate into the local community, including English lessons, employment support, tenancy workshops, and assistance with claiming benefits.

Our Homes for Ukraine Moving On team have enabled the majority of our refugees to seek their own independent accommodation, while others have safely returned to Ukraine.

We wanted to share some stories from Ukrainians who have settled into the district with our support.

“I would like to express my sincere appreciation for all the support you have provided to Ukrainians since 2022. It has been truly reassuring to know that we have the backing of our local Council at all levels - in education and children’s support, access to information, community events, employment support, or, most importantly, assistance in finding homes. The team’s proactive approach and guidance allowed us to relocate within the same village, which was essential for our family’s stability and mental well-being. Thanks to their efforts, we did not have to change schools, and the transition went smoothly.” – Olena Biletska

“When I needed to move away from my sponsors, finding accommodation in England proved to be a real challenge. High prices, and competition for rent made the process difficult. It was especially difficult to find options without a large deposit and with flexible terms for newcomers. Luckily, I had the support of the Council’s Homes For Ukraine team. Thanks to their help, I received the necessary information, advice and real support in obtaining housing, furniture and household appliances. I am very grateful for this support - without it, my journey to my new home would have been much more difficult” – Natalia Kiriienko

Homes for Ukraine visa’s were initially for three years, or 18 months if they applied after 19th February 2024. As Ukrainians transition to the Ukraine Permission Extension scheme, which is an 18-month visa extension, we want to remind them we are here to support them every step of the way. ## **Transport: Greater Cambridge Greenways pave the way forward**

The Greater Cambridge Partnership’s (GCP) greenways are providing a greener, healthier way to get around South Cambridgeshire.

From school runs to weekend rides, walking, wheeling and cycling around South Cambridgeshire is about to get safer, and more accessible.

The GCP’s greenways are delivering major improvements to local walking, wheeling and cycling routes – connecting villages to each other and to Cambridge, whilst enabling healthier, happier journeys.

Here’s what’s coming up this summer and what it means for your day-to-day travel.

### **Adams Road: A first for England**

One of the biggest changes for South Cambridgeshire cyclists heading into Cambridge is set to begin with construction on Adams Road, part of the Comberton Greenway. Already used by over 3,000 cyclists daily, Adams Road will become England’s first Cycle Street, giving people on bikes priority over cars and making the route safer for all. Rain gardens will be planted along the roadside to help with drainage and enhance the streetscape, while pedestrians will benefit from wider pavements.

“Projects like the new cycle street on Adams Road are all about making everyday journeys easier and safer for people,” says Thomas Fitzpatrick, Head of Programme at GCP.

“Whether it’s cycling into the city, walking to school, or getting around your village, these changes are designed to fit into daily life and give people more choice in how they travel.”

## **Barton: Safer routes for families**

In Barton, construction is underway to improve road safety for all users – especially for families walking to Barton Primary School. Upgrades include a new 20 mile an hour speed limit; raised crossings and speed bumps and a zebra crossing on New Road, helping children feel more confident getting to school. Later this summer, work will begin on widening the Barton Road path between Cambridge and Haggis Farm roundabout.

## **Shepreth, Stapleford and Great Shelford: Better village links**

Following improvements from Meldreth Station to Station Road, the focus is now going to be on preparing the Shepreth spur of the Melbourn Greenway for construction, where work will create safer village travel through traffic calming measures.

Later this year, the Sawston Greenway moves ahead with improvements through Stapleford and Great Shelford, offering better paths for walking, cycling and wheeling, and stronger links to Cambridge and communities in neighbouring villages.

Waresley and Gransden Woods are two ancient oak-ash woods, a type of woodland only found in lowlands like South Cambridgeshire.

Many breeding birds such as Redwings and Long-tailed Tits live in the woodlands. The woods are bursting with flowers like bluebells, violets and primroses. These attract an array of insects; over 500 species of moth and butterfly have been recorded at the woods!

They offer brewery tours, tasting experiences, and a delightful taproom where local street vendors offer delicious food to pair with their brews – a great example of businesses working together.

Milton Brewery in Waterbeach is a traditional English ale brewery with time-honoured techniques creating award-winning drinks. With a deep knowledge of all things malt and hops related, they champion strong and complex satisfying bitters. You can sample their ales at The Rose & Crown in Histon.
