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1. Brexit – updates and reminders



'<u>The UK's new start: let's get going</u>' government campaign includes a <u>checker tool</u> to identify the steps that businesses or individuals need to take ahead of the end of the Brexit transition period on 31 December. The tool enables business to answer seven key questions which will return information specific to your business sector on the steps you need to take.

There are actions your business can take now to prepare for the end of the transition period that are not dependent on the outcome of the negotiations. You can also <u>sign</u> <u>up to receive the government's regular Business Readiness Transition</u> <u>Bulletin</u> providing information on major announcements and recently published guidance.

Cambridge Network – we need to talk about Brexit. Now!

Cambridge Network is hosting an event where Professor Catherine Barnard, Professor of European Union Law and the Jean Monnet Chair of EU Law in the Faculty of Law at the University of Cambridge, will explain why it is important to get regulation right at the outset and why law underpins every aspect of how Brexit will play out. The event will take place on Friday 18 September, 10-11am and <u>registration</u> is free for Cambridge Network members with a £50 fee for nonmembers.

The Federation of Small Businesses

Small businesses can find comprehensive advice via the Federation of Small Businesses website within the <u>Brexit section</u>.

The Chambers of Commerce

The Chambers of Commerce has a Brexit Hub containing detailed <u>information</u> on what businesses need to do to be ready for the end of the transition period.

The Chamber is also running 'Countdown to Change' <u>webinars, from</u> 22 September and counting down to the end of the transition period. They will take place 100 days, 75 days, 50 days and 30 days before the end of the transition period to guide businesses through the complexity of change in import and export processes, systems and controls. Webinar dates are 22 September, 16 October, 11 November and 1 December.

Frontier workers

The government has updated the guidance on the rights and status of frontier workers – EU, EEA or Swiss citizens that regularly commute to the UK because they are employed or self-employed here but live elsewhere. The <u>guidance</u> covers frontier workers who want to continue to work in the UK and those who want to enter the UK from 1 January 2021.

Reminder - grants for businesses completing customs declarations

The <u>customs grant scheme</u> is open for applications. £50 million has been invested as part of the measures to accelerate growth of the customs intermediary sector and help meet the increased demand it will see from traders at the end of the transition period.

Customs intermediaries – including customs brokers, freight forwarders and express parcel operators – as well as traders who complete their own declarations, are among those who can now apply for grant funding to support with:

 Training – where the grant will give you up to 100% of the actual costs of externally-provided training for your employees, up to a limit of £1,500 for each employee on the course. It will also cover the cost of training you run internally, up to a limit of £250 for each employee on the course.

- Hiring new staff to help your business complete customs declarations the grant will give you £3,000 towards recruitment costs for each new employee. Up front recruitment costs will not be covered for an employee redeployed from another part of the business, unless this is part of an external recruitment campaign. You could also receive up to £12,000 to cover the salary costs for each new or redeployed employee.
- IT improvements to help your business complete customs declarations more efficiently - the grant will give you 100% of the costs relating to your IT expenditure to improve the efficiency of making customs declarations.

2. Coronavirus finance, business support and employment updates

Kickstart Scheme

The government has launched the new <u>Kickstart Scheme</u> in Great Britain, a £2 billion fund to create hundreds of thousands of high quality 6-month work placements aimed at those aged 16 to 24 who are on Universal Credit and are deemed to be at risk of long term unemployment.

Funding available for each job will cover 100% of the relevant National Minimum Wage for 25 hours a week, plus the associated employer National Insurance contributions and employer minimum automatic enrolment contributions.

Funding is available following a successful application process. Applications must be for a minimum of 30 job placements. If you are unable to offer this many job placements, you can partner with other organisations with a nominated representative for a group of employers.

- If you are an employer looking to create job placements for over 30 young people, <u>check if you can apply for funding</u> as part of the Kickstart Scheme.
- If you are considering becoming a representative for a group of employers, <u>check what information you need to provide</u> to apply for a grant through the Kickstart Scheme.

The scheme will be managed through The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) and, whilst local representatives are currently being sourced for businesses looking to offer less than 30 placements, you can initially register your interest with the <u>Business Support team</u>. We will be happy to answer any questions you may have and will provide more information and guidance as soon as it becomes available.

Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme update

From 1 September, the government will pay 70% of wages up to a maximum cap of $\pounds 2,187.50$ for the hours the employee is on furlough. Employers will top up employees' wages to ensure they receive 80% (up to $\pounds 2,500$).

From 1 October the government will pay 60% and employers will pay 20% of employees' wages for the time they are being furloughed. Employers will also continue to pay their National Insurance and pension contributions.

Further guidance is available on the scheme which will close on 31 October.

Second stage of Self-Employment Income Support Scheme (SEISS) - reminder

The second stage of the <u>Self Employment Income Support Scheme</u> is open for applications. Those eligible will now be able to receive a second and final grant worth 70% of their average monthly trading profits, paid out in a single instalment covering 3 months' worth of profits, and capped at £6,570 in total. The <u>eligibility</u> <u>criteria</u> remains the same as for the first grant, with people needing to have had trading profits of no more than £50,000, making up at least half of their total income. To make a claim for the second and final grant the business must have been affected on or after 14 July 2020. HMRC has published <u>guidance</u> on deciding if a businesses has been adversely affected by coronavirus. HMRC will contact all potentially eligible customers to advise them that they can claim for a second and final SEISS grant. The claim for the second and final grant must be made on or before 19 October 2020.

Bounce Back Loan Scheme (BBLS)

The Bounce Back Loan Scheme enables smaller businesses to access finance more quickly during the coronavirus outbreak. The scheme helps small and medium-sized businesses to borrow between £2,000 and up to 25% of their turnover. The maximum loan available is £50,000. The government guarantees 100% of the loan and there won't be any fees or interest to pay for the first 12 months. After 12 months the interest rate will be 2.5% a year. If you need a larger loan, you may be entitled to other government support.

Coronavirus Business Interruption Loan Scheme (CIBILS)

The <u>Coronavirus Business Interruption Loan</u> Scheme provides financial support to smaller businesses affected by the pandemic. The scheme helps small and medium-sized businesses to access loans and other kinds of finance up to £5 million. The government guarantees 80% of the finance to the lender and pays interest and any fees for the first 12 months. If you're a larger business, you may be entitled to <u>other</u> <u>government support</u>.

Coronavirus financial help for your business

The government business support <u>finder</u> will enable you to find what support is available to employers and the self employed, including sole traders and Ltd Company Directors. You may be eligible for loans and tax relief whether your business is open or closed.

Joint Biosecurity Centre Action Cards

The Joint Biosecurity Centre has developed <u>Action Cards</u>, which reflect the latest advice on how to identify, manage and report a coronavirus outbreak. The cards are designed as a useful visual checklist for operational teams and bring together guidance and useful contacts to support your organisation's planning. These products have been developed with local authority and public feedback and will help businesses and other organisations work effectively with their local public health teams.

Culture Recovery Fund

Through the £1.57 billion <u>Culture Recovery Fund</u>, the government is providing support for performing arts, heritage sites, independent cinemas, music venues and museums to help weather the impact of the pandemic.

Its #HereForCulture campaign has been launched to help support Britain's globally renowned arts, culture and heritage industries.

Organisations across these sectors are encouraged to apply for:

Arts Council England - £500m grants

This grant is open for <u>applications</u> for cultural organisations (both profit and not for profit) that are at imminent risk of failure because of the pandemic and who need funding of up to £3m.

Arts Council England - £270m repayable finance fund

This programme is for cultural organisations who need <u>funding</u> of over £3m. The progamme offers financial support where organisations were financially sustainable before the pandemic but are now at clear risk of no longer trading viably by 31 March 2021, and have exhausted all other options for increasing their resilience.

Culture Recovery Fund for Independent Cinemas - £30m for independent cinemas

The British Film Institute (BFI) will be administering this <u>grant</u> on behalf of the government. It is for building-based independent cinemas, who provide a year-round film programme, that are at risk of failure because of the pandemic.

3. Other Business Support

Start Up loans

Start Up loans provide government-backed personal loans for business purposes. They are available to individuals over the age of 18 who are eligible to start a business in the UK. Generally, loans of up to £25,000 are available at a fixed rate of interest and are repayable over 1 to 5 years.

Delivery partners for the loans in the East of England are listed on our <u>website</u>. In addition to helping applicants prepare their business plan and cash flow forecast, the delivery partners are responsible for assessing final loan applications and providing ongoing mentoring support to successful applicants.

Commercial waste

4. Innovation and competitions

Solar Together Cambridgeshire

Solar panels are an excellent way to save money on energy bills and cut carbon emissions, and this is why South Cambridgeshire District Council is working with Cambridgeshire County Council to deliver <u>Solar Together Cambridgeshire</u>, a groupbuying scheme to help businesses purchase high-quality and competitively priced solar panels and battery storage systems for solar panels. You have to be the owner of the roof on which you want to install a solar panel system, or have the explicit approval of the owner, in order to participate. Small and medium-sized enterprises and Commonhold Associations meeting this criterion can participate as well. <u>Register</u> your interest by 6 October.

SMART grants - reminder

Smart is Innovate UK's 'Open grant funding' competition. Innovate UK, part of UK Research and Innovation, is investing up to £25 million in the best game-changing and commercially viable innovative or disruptive ideas. All proposals must be business focused.

Applications can come from any area of technology and be applied to any part of the economy, such as, but not exclusively:

- the arts, design and media
- creative industries
- science or engineering

The competition is open to a wide variety of innovations with the potential to be game-changing. You can watch a <u>video</u> to find out more about the SMART grants opportunity. The competition will close Wednesday 25 November at 11am.

Women in Innovation Awards 2020/21

Innovate UK, as part of UK Research and Innovation, is offering 10 Women in Innovation Awards to female entrepreneurs across the UK. The winners will <u>receive</u> a £50,000 grant and a bespoke package of mentoring, coaching and business support. The competition will close Wednesday 14 October at 11am.

Developing the UK's low carbon automotive capability

The Advanced Propulsion Centre (APC) invests up to £30 million, 3 times a year, in collaborative research and development (R&D) projects. These are pre-production match-funded projects. In this round APC is investing £27 million.

UK registered businesses can <u>apply</u> for a share of up to £27 million for UKdeveloped late stage R&D, to support growth in advanced low carbon propulsion capability in the automotive sector. This competition closes on Wednesday 14 October at 11am.

Designing sustainable plastic solutions

This competition is to win <u>funding</u> for early-stage, human-centred design projects to reduce plastics' harm to the environment, increase productivity and grow the UK economy. This competition closes Wednesday 16 September at 12pm.

Manufacturing made smarter: digital supply chain, feasibility studies

UK registered businesses can <u>apply</u> for funding towards feasibility studies into digital technologies to transform supply chains in UK manufacturing. This funding is from the Industrial Strategy Challenge Fund. This competition will close Wednesday 7 October at 11am.

Cambridge Network - boosting your business through networking

6. Procurement opportunities

South Cambridgeshire District Council Zero Carbon Communities – procurement opportunities

The Zero Carbon Communities Grant Scheme is a pioneering scheme launched last year by South Cambridgeshire District Council to support community action on climate change. Round two of the Zero Carbon Communities Grant has recently launched and we wanted to share two procurement opportunities linked to this grant scheme.

Can you supply electric bikes/trikes?

The Council is looking for a suitably qualified and experienced <u>supplier to provide</u> <u>electric bikes/trikes for the Council to purchase</u>, which the Council would pay for directly. The aim of providing electric bikes/trikes is to help reduce the miles travelled in private vehicles and increase the take-up of cycling by people who would not otherwise cycle.

Energy efficiency support package

The Zero Carbon Communities Grant will also provide funding for a variety of projects and services which will include improvements to community buildings to reduce the need for fossil fuel energy. If applications to our grant scheme for Community Building Energy Surveys are successful, we will require a supplier to provide a cost effective, flexible, high quality and value for money energy efficiency support package to cover all aspects of the building energy use.

This could include: Insulation and airtightness; Lighting efficiency, illumination levels and control; Heating and hot water generation, distribution and control; Ventilation and air-conditioning; IT, office and catering equipment; and Staff behaviour change.
