Bronze statuette head of a male Celtic deity, from the Girton College settlement; has a socket on the back for attaching it by pin to a body or some fixture, while the unfinished appearance of the back suggests that it was intended for a niche where only the front and sides would be visible. The portrayal of the face may be described as 'provincial' rather than 'classical', with the features crudely executed.
- 3. At least 2/3 cremation and 3 inhumations are confirmed as Roman, and thought to date from the late 1st-early 5th centuries AD.
- 4. Two sculptures are listed as coming from a rubbish pit during the Girton College excavations in 1888. The first is the weathered left hand side of a draped male torso in oolitic limestone, wearing a closely fitting smooth garment with a broad belt. The second are fragments of a group showing a lion and its prey, suggested to come from a funerary monument.
- 5. At least six burials are undoubtedly those of Romano-Britons. It has been suggested that the sculpture of the lion was actually carved on top of a tombstone instead of having been a freestanding funerary monument. The evidence of stone and tile found at the site could be evidence for a dwelling near by, but it seems more likely that they were used for the construction of tombs.

In 1933 Chrystabel Proctor took over the garden and concentrated on the 14 acres of vegetables and fruit to produce large quantities of produce while at the same time improving the rest of the gardens. After the Second World War the vegetables began to disappear and be replaced with flowering shrubs and specimen trees. The apple collection was improved. In 1992 Penelope Hobhouse, designed a green theatre for the Fellow's Garden which used yew for the theatre wings against a backdrop of trees. The auditorium is a semi circular lawn edged with shrubs and scented flowers for summer performances.

Description

1. In 2008, excavations at University Farm in NW Cambridge revealed a metalled trackway dating to the Medieval period. It was aligned NW-SE and was flanked by roadside ditches which represented at least two phases of re-establishment with the northern ditch being infilled and overlain with an area of metalling, whilst the southern ditch had been re-cut with the northern one. Roman pottery was found in one boundary but is likely to be residual. Further evidence of the trackways alignment was identified in the 2009 investigation to the area again with ditches showing evidence of phases of activity. One of the ditches produced sherds of C12th St. Neots-type Ware indicating that the feature is most probably Medieval in date.

Sealed beneath the roadside ditches were several features of earlier date including a gully, truncated pit and a cluster of pits, although none of these contained datable material. During the earlier investigation in 2008 however a ditch had been found which contained Iron Age pottery although it is not clear whether this may be residual. A pit containing Late Iron Age and roman pottery was also found but it is almost certainly the result of post-enclosure excavation from the post-Medieval period. See MCB19125

Description

1. In 2009, an evaluation at University Farm in NW Cambridge revealed a series of gullies, ditches and pits predominantly Medieval in date. The main focus of activity on the site was represented by a NNE-SSW aligned gully and a NW-SE aligned ditch, with a large assemblage of Medieval pottery being found in the gully. Whilst the majority were C13th coarsewares a small quantity of St. Neots-type ware accompanied it along with a fragment of building stone and 20 fragments of daub. There were also pits in this area from which were recovered fragments of C15th Essex Red Ware and St. Neots-type Ware. All the finds from this area suggest a nearby domestic occupation during the Medieval period. In addition to these features, three undated gullies and a pit were identified to the west which all have similar fills and morphology to the eastern features and may have formed part of an enclosure or paddock system although it should be noted that one of the gullies contained exclusively post-medieval material and could therefore be part of a later landscape which followed the existing Medieval layout. Additionally, during the 2009 excavations a former hedgeline/boundary was recorded near to Site IX which could have been used to divide the settlement from the surrounding fields. Gullies associated with the hedgeline contained post-Medieval pottery which could indicate that the area did not return to arable land until its foundation as University Farm in 1909.

2. Archaeological excavations undertaken between April and June 2014 in advance of major redevelopment to the northwest of Cambridge for a new settlement at Eddington revealed substantial remains of a medieval settlement. The settlement excavated is identified as Howes, a settlement previously identified in investigations at Howes Close (ECB152), 2 Girton Road (ECB2058), NIAB HQ (ECB2592) and Huntingdon Road (ECB1945). The earlier evaluation (ECB3145) revealed several broad archaeological phases from the medieval through to the present day.

Finds and features of a pre medieval date were limited to small numbers of residual Prehistoric and Roman material from later features. Two tree-throws were identified that likely predated the medieval period, however, no datable finds were recovered from their fills. A small number of undiagnostic flint chips and burnt flint were recovered, while at least 22 hobnails of probable Roman date were recovered from a 15th century pit, the authors suggested that this may indicate a Roman burial site in the vicinity. The main period of activity on the site dates to the medieval period and the settlement identified as Howes. Documentary research for the settlement is varied owing to its position at the junction of four parishes, however, Howes appears to have formed in around the 12th century during a period of transition from dispersed settlement to more nucleated villages. Datable finds and stratigraphic sequences indicated four broad phases of activity spanning some 300-400 years. Phase 1 saw the establishment of plots B and C in around the mid 12th century, phase 2 saw the expansion of the two plots and the establishment of plots A, D and E in the early-mid 13th century. Evidence then indicates plots A, B and C expanded in the late 13th century

while in the early to mid 15th century plots A and B expanded while C, D and E were abandoned.

The excavation evidence indicates settlement took the form of a series of rectilinear or sub-rectilinear ditched enclosures fronting onto Huntingdon Road forming five plots (A-E) with a zone of activity to the rear. Within each enclosure the evidence suggests a number of pits of uncertain or varied functions, postholes forming no clear pattern, some internal subdivisions and wells, cesspits and some timber lined pits. Evidence of metalled surfaces and timber structures were encountered a short distance to the northeast of the excavated areas.

Activity continued into the post medieval period, albeit at a smaller scale than before with only plots A and B continuing into the 16th century, while an absence of clay tobacco pipe across the site indicates settlement had ceased by the early 17th century. Evidence from the evaluation and excavation phases indicated that several of the ditches continued in use throughout the post medieval period.

By the 20th century the area comprised farmland associated with the University Farm held by the University and it would appear the enclosures fell out of use during this period of activity.

The finds assemblage from Site IX remained limited for all periods. A total of 1260 sherds of pottery was recovered from the excavation in addition to the 88 sherds from the evaluation with the vast majority dating to the medieval period with the exception of a single sherd of Roman pottery and a small quantity of modern pottery. Early medieval fabrics included St Neots Ware, Thetford ware and Stamford ware, while medieval fabrics included Brill/Boarstall, developed Stamford ware, Ely wares, Essex wares, Grimston, Hedingham, Huntingdonshire Fen Sandy, Lyveden, pink shelly, Surrey Borders. Almost half the medieval fabrics were too small or degraded to accurately identify. The metal assemblage included 179 pieces including the quantity of Roman hobnails from a later 15th century pit and a spur fragment. A single mid 13th century coin was recovered. Other finds included 8 fragments of tile, 26g of burnt clay, worked stone including rotary quern, lava querns and whetstone fragments, some slag and a single spindlewhorl. Animal remains comprised 1358 bone fragments and some marine and avian shell fragments. A number of environmental samples were taken from features with 24 submitted for further assessment.

The evaluation and excavation have revealed some significant information associated with the deserted medieval settlement at Howes suggesting the village formed a group of rectilinear enclosures centred on Huntingdon Road. The settlement is unusual in that it covers four historic parishes and that each plot appears to have been defined by ditched boundaries, only switching to hedge or wattle and daub fencing in the early post medieval period. The finds assemblage also indicated some unusual aspects including an animal bone assemblage dominated by horse and a shellfish assemblage dominated by mussels rather than oyster.

Description

1. Results of the 2009 excavations following the 2008 excavations and fieldwalking at University Farm in NW Cambridge (see MCB18271 for the 2008 finds and features in the area covered by Site IV). Site IV was the largest and most complex site of the project spanning five main periods of activity dating from Mesolithic to Roman. There is a small quantity of residual Mesolithic flint and Early Neolithic Mildenhall pottery. During the late Bronze Age two small enclosures were established. During the early Roman period a settlement was established in the southwestern corner. Occupation increased largely around the 2nd century, of rectilinear enclosures and a trackway (See Site III - MCB19116). Also present was a regularly laid out inhumation cemetery containing four interments and one cremation.
