Service Support Grants (SSG) from South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) help to support voluntary, community and social enterprise (VCSE) sector organisations in South Cambridgeshire that deliver services for residents of all ages. These were established in their current format in 2012 and the current three-year round of the SSG grant ends in March 2026. This proposal relates to the next 3 year round of the scheme which will launch in September 2025 and organisations will receive funding for the period between April 2026 and the end of March 2029

If other, please specify The SSG grant scheme is designed for community groups to apply directly. Funding decisions may affect the viability of these schemes and, consequently, impact their clients. Beneficiaries of the Mental Health and Wellbeing theme include children and young people, as well as vulnerable residents such as those facing mental health challenges or experiencing isolation. Under the Advice Services theme, the beneficiaries are members of the general public who



need guidance on issues like debt, benefits, employment, housing, legal matters, and family concerns. This also includes disabled individuals, carers, families with disabled children, people unable to live independently, and residents in rural or underserved areas. For Independent Living, the grant supports older adults, carers-particularly those experiencing burnout-individuals suffering from loneliness or isolation, people living with dementia, and those with physical, learning, or sensory disabilities. Ethnic minority groups facing systemic barriers and residents in rural areas who require community transport or neighbour support also benefit. The Voluntary and Community Sector theme supports local community groups and charities, as well as voluntary sector organisations that provide services to South Cambridgeshire residents. Lastly, the Cost-of-Living Support theme benefits low-income families, including those facing food insecurity, struggling with childcare access, or living in areas of high deprivation.

This new SCDC grant scheme offers grants over three years to support a wide range of community needs across South Cambridgeshire, with a focus on improving wellbeing, access to services, and community resilience. Groups and individuals will be affected in several positive ways. Residents experiencing mental health challenges, particularly children, young people, and vulnerable individuals, will benefit from improved access to support services and wellbeing initiatives. Those in need of advice such as people facing financial hardship, legal issues, or housing problems will gain access to free, confidential, and impartial guidance, including specialist support for disabled individuals, carers, and families with complex needs. The scheme also aims to help people maintain their independence, especially older adults, carers, and those living in rural or isolated areas. This includes support for neighbour schemes, community transport, and services for people with disabilities or those experiencing loneliness. Ethnic minority groups facing systemic barriers will also be supported through inclusive and accessible services. Community groups



and voluntary organisations will benefit from funding that helps them operate more effectively and sustainably. This includes support with governance, training, fundraising, and strategic representation. Additionally, low-income families struggling with the cost of living will receive targeted support, particularly around food insecurity and childcare access. Finally, the PLACE-based funding will allow for tailored, locally driven projects that address specific community needs, ensuring services are accessible, culturally appropriate, and delivered in ways that reflect the unique characteristics of each area.

SSG grant funding has been running for a number of years and is intended to support residents in South Cambridgeshire. The communities team publicises the grant heavily to the Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) sector and members of the public. The grant scheme already has support from the Leadership Team, the Lead Cabinet Members, and the Chair of the



Grants Advisory Committee who have, along with officers from the Communities team, inputted into the design of the grant scheme.

Details: We will not monitor applicants (or clients receiving support) by protected characteristics and this will not affect any decision-making. However, the services are targeted at specific cohorts of people:

In terms of age, both children and young people will benefit from mental health and wellbeing services, while older adults will be supported through independent living initiatives and community transport schemes. People with disabilities, including those with physical, learning, or sensory impairments, as well as individuals with mental health conditions will receive targeted support through advice services, accessible community initiatives, and inclusive service design. Families with disabled children and individuals unable to live independently are also key beneficiaries. Ethnic



minority groups, particularly those facing systemic inequalities, racism, or barriers to accessing services, will benefit from culturally competent and inclusive support across multiple grant themes. While not explicitly stated, women, who are often overrepresented among unpaid carers and low-income families, are likely to benefit from services aimed at carers and cost-of-living support. Pregnant women and new mothers may also be supported indirectly through initiatives focused on childcare access and family wellbeing. Unpaid carers, who often support disabled or elderly family members, are a significant focus of the scheme, with dedicated support for respite, emotional wellbeing, and advocacy. Overall, the grant scheme is designed to address the needs of diverse and often marginalised groups, ensuring services are accessible, inclusive, and responsive to the challenges faced by those with protected characteristics.

The Development Officer can help with technical queries and signpost to organisations such as digital buddies and Cambridge Online who can provide support and equipment for completing applications.

Details: Unpaid carers and those working in care roles often experience emotional strain, burnout, and limited support. The scheme helps by: Offering respite services, emotional support, and resources specifically for carers. Providing specialist advice and advocacy to help carers navigate benefits, housing, and legal matters.

Supporting community organisations that deliver services to carers, helping them



operate sustainably and expand their reach. Encouraging peer support networks and inclusive service design that recognises the unique pressures carers face.

⊠ Rurality

Details Residents in rural areas often face barriers such as limited access to services, transport, and social opportunities. The grant scheme addresses these challenges by: Supporting community transport schemes (e.g. Dial-a-Ride, Community Car schemes) to improve mobility and access to essential services. Funding outreach services that bring advice, mental health support, and wellbeing activities directly into villages and isolated communities. Encouraging the use of local assets like community halls and hubs to deliver services closer to where people live. Promoting neighbour support schemes to reduce isolation and strengthen local networks..

Details Low-income individuals and families, especially those facing food insecurity or childcare challenges, are directly supported through: Cost-of-living grants that fund services like food banks, community kitchens, and affordable childcare hubs. Advice services that help people manage debt, access benefits, and understand their rights. PLACE-based projects that target areas of high deprivation, ensuring services are tailored to local needs and accessible without stigma. Support for voluntary and community sector organisations that work with disadvantaged groups, helping them build capacity and deliver essential services.
