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Putting you first

If you phone us we will:

- resolve your enquiry as quickly as possible.
- provide voicemail if the person you need is unavailable.
- answer your phone message within three working days.

If you write to us we will:

- reply to your letter or email within 10 working days.

If we write to you we will:

- write in plain language.
- arrange for translation, large type, braille or audio tapes upon request.

If we visit you we will:

- carry identification that you can check with a phone call.

- arrive at the time we say we will, or give you as much notice as possible if we have to change the time.

Assisted digital service support

News in brief

New rules to prevent anti-social driving at Milton Park and Ride

We've confirmed plans to tackle antisocial and dangerous driving at Milton Park and Ride. Our Cabinet agreed to implement a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) in Butt Lane. This introduces new rules which – if broken – could lead to fines.

Recent issues reported late at night and at weekends included cars and motorbikes speeding, revving engines, racing, stunts, loud music, and threatening or rude behaviour.

We consulted on plans for the PSPO – with 118 of 125 respondents in favour. One person said the site sounded like the starting grid at a racetrack. Automatic number plate recognition systems and CCTV will now be used to enforce the new rules, allowing vehicles to be tracked and fines issued if the dangerous driving continues.

Remember to re-apply for your postal vote

Our Elections team have been in touch with over 15,000 South Cambridgeshire postal voters - by post and email - to let them know their postal votes will expire at the end of January.

If you have received a letter or email from us, and you wish to continue to vote by post, you must make a new application as soon as possible. Your postal vote will be removed if you don't make a new application.

Community Chest Update

We get on average five applications a month for our Community Chest grants, reflecting interest from a wide range of not-for-profit organisations across South Cambridgeshire, including day centres, bowls clubs, and youth groups.

When your magazine went to print, we had just under £45,000 remaining in our Community Chest budget, alongside around £1,300 in the Biodiversity budget. These sums are available until the end of March 2026. Recent projects that we have funded include Cambridge Sport Lakes Trust in Milton, who purchased a nesting raft, and Lolworth Parish Meeting, who are replacing basketball facilities for residents.

Stay active this winter

Our Active & Healthy 4 Life programme includes the exercise referral scheme available at all community sports centres, and cardiac rehabilitation classes at Sawston and Cambourne sports centres. These sessions provide support locally for a range of health conditions. This includes high blood pressure and cholesterol, diabetes, osteoporosis, arthritis, asthma, or pre/post operative and mental health, and a specialist cardiac class for those having experienced a cardiac event. You are introduced to exercise to suit your health and current ability by qualified and experienced instructors.

Simply ask your health professional to complete a referral form, then contact your preferred sports centre to schedule an instructor appointment. Join for £20 per month for four months.

Have your say on the future of Greater Cambridge

We're encouraging communities to have their say on the next stage of the Greater Cambridge Local Plan, which shows where new homes, workplaces and community facilities could be built over the next 20 years.

On 1 December we will launch a consultation on the next stage of the draft Plan. It will run until 30 January 2026.

It will be the first joint Plan for Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire and has been prepared by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning service which we share with Cambridge City Council. It is a Government requirement that we have this new Plan.

The Plan follows significant work by Greater Cambridge Shared Planning on our area's well known infrastructure constraints. It also builds upon consultation feedback from 2021 and updated assessments of jobs and housing needs - with confirmation of the need for around 50,000 new homes between 2024 and 2045. This is to meet the forecast increase in jobs.

Some 37,000 of these homes are already provided for through planning permissions and sites identified in the existing local plans from 2018. The latest changes to the draft Plan also take account of the Government's recent decision not to fund the relocation of Cambridge Waste Water treatment works.

Effectively managed growth

Locations for many of these developments were already identified in previous draft versions of the Plan - such as at Cambridge Airport and at Cambridge Biomedical Campus. Further development is proposed at Cambourne, which is set to become one of the best-connected places in the region through the A428 upgrade by National Highways, the Greater Cambridge Partnership's proposed public transport bus corridor, and East West Rail's project for a new railway station.

A new community of 6,000 homes is also proposed on land next to the A11 and A1307 near Great Abington, to deliver new homes near to the existing science campuses and connected to planned public transport improvements.

The draft Plan reflects the Government's continued enthusiasm for growth across the area by enabling sites like the Cambridge Biomedical Campus and Babraham Research Campus to grow further. In addition, to reflect evidence of a growing need for logistics and new industrial spaces, it identifies two new sites near the A14 - including the expansion of existing lorry parking at Cambridge Services.

There are still challenges before the Plan could be put into practice though. This includes ongoing work by the Government and water industry to find solutions to water supply and treatment issues currently impacting developments across Greater Cambridge. Despite this, progressing the Plan to establish a clear overall strategy for future development as required by Government is important if we are to manage further growth effectively.

Your voice matters

When finalised - the Local Plan will influence planning decisions for years to come. It's designed to provide homes for our children, support our economy, protect the area's unique character, and ensure future growth is matched with the right infrastructure – with a focus on making walking, cycling and public transport the first choice.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Planning, Cllr Dr. Tumi Hawkins, said: *"This is another key milestone on our path towards the new homes we need – along with protecting our local habitats and landscapes. We must plan responsibly to ensure new homes and jobs don't come at the expense of our environment, and this consultation is a further opportunity for you to help us strike the right balance."*

The draft Plan builds on years of public engagement and thousands of comments already received through previous consultations; the First Conversation in 2020 and First Proposals in 2021.

Young designers leave their mark in Sawston

We've held a special launch event to celebrate the unveiling of two impressive benches designed by local schoolchildren in Sawston.

The benches, now proudly standing in the playground of Icknield Primary School on Lynton Way, are the result of a collaboration between pupils, our planners, and developers.

Back in October 2022, our Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Youth Engagement Service ran workshops with 32 year six students. The sessions explored proposals by developers, Abstract, to build new research and development facilities at Dales Manor Business Park in Sawston. Pupils aged 10 and 11 were invited to take part in the planning and decision-making process. They gained hands-on experience in placemaking and planning, while learning about the importance of protecting and enhancing the natural environment.

As part of the workshop, the pupils were tasked with drawing designs for street furniture which could sit outside the new research facilities. They also received guidance on careers in urban design, landscape architecture, town planning, and local government.

Three years later, the two children whose designs were selected for the wooden benches returned to Icknield Primary School with their families to see their creative ideas brought to life. Head teacher Diane Mitchell, teachers, our Lead Cabinet Member for Planning, Cllr Dr. Tumi Hawkins, officers from our Greater Cambridge Shared Planning service, architects and developers all attended the launch.

Replica benches have also been installed at the entrance of the newly completed research and development centre in Sawston. Located in a publicly accessible area, the benches mark the completion of a high-spec, environmentally conscious life sciences building that will bring new jobs to the village.

To mark the occasion, young designers were presented with framed copies of their drawings and commemorative mugs.

Cllr Dr Tumi Hawkins said: *“It’s inspiring to see how these young people have contributed to shaping their local environment. This project shows the power of engaging children in planning and design - it’s not just educational, it’s transformational. Their creativity and vision will be enjoyed by the community for years to come.”*

Constructing a sustainable new neighbourhood in Cambourne

The South Cambridgeshire Investment Partnership (SCIP) is a 50:50 joint venture between ourselves and Hill, one of the UK's largest private housebuilders.

SCIP's plan is to deliver a sustainable new neighbourhood for the community on Land North of Lower Cambourne.

The proposals are for 256 much needed new homes, 40% of which will be affordable, alongside new open spaces, children's play areas, cycle and pedestrian routes and a market square.

The maiden scheme for SCIP is being developed across the road from our head office - South Cambridgeshire Hall in Cambourne. Of the 256 homes being built, 102 will be affordable and we will take these on as Council homes. The development is called Cambium Square.

What type of homes are we building?

The 102 affordable homes will be a mix of affordable rent and shared ownership, ranging in size from one bed flats to four bed houses.

A main objective for the whole scheme is to be an enhanced sustainability development through a package of carbon reduction measures such as air source heat pumps, electric vehicle chargers, solar panels, triple glazing and improved insulation.

This will all ultimately lead to lower energy bills for residents.

What are the timelines for the new homes?

The affordable properties are due to come forwards across four of the development phases with the forecast completion timelines as follows:

Phase 1 – October 2026 through to February 2027

Phase 2 – February 2028

Phase 3 – May 2029

Phase 4 – April 2030

Boosting energy efficiency in Council homes

We're ensuring our tenants get the most benefit possible from more than £8.2 million which we received from the Government's Warm Homes: Social Housing fund scheme.

The fund is designed to support energy efficiency upgrades for social housing in England. Its goal is to make social housing more energy efficient, reduce carbon emissions, and help tackle fuel poverty.

On top of this Government funding, we are contributing £10 million - consisting of Council house rents - towards the programme of energy efficiency upgrades for tenants.

Through the programme overall, our Council tenants will feel the benefit of more than 2,300 individual energy efficiency measures, including:

- Cavity wall insulation
- Loft insulation
- Air source heat pumps
- Solar panels
- Ventilation improvements
- External wall insulation

The upgrades aim to bring Council homes up to at least an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of C, helping tenants reduce their energy usage and lower their bills by over £200 a year.

We are allocating funding to properties with priority given to those most in need of energy efficiency improvements. Our tenants are being contacted direct if their home is able to benefit – with the aim for us to have as many of our 5,500 properties above the EPC rating of C in the next four years.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Housing, Cllr John Batchelor, said: *"This is a fantastic example of how we're working to improve the quality of life for our tenants while also tackling the climate emergency."*

By making our Council homes warmer and more energy efficient, we're reducing energy bills for families and cutting carbon emissions at the same time. I'm proud that South Cambridgeshire is leading the way in delivering real, positive change for our communities."

Ongoing support for those affected by domestic abuse

We're committed to creating a culture where everyone feels safe, valued, and respected.

Around 3.9 million people in the UK experienced domestic abuse last year, with women disproportionately affected.

Through our links to the Domestic Abuse Housing Alliance (DAHA) and White Ribbon UK, we work to respond effectively to domestic abuse. Our colleagues are trained to support survivors, spot signs of abuse and provide advice.

Our Housing Advice Service can help if you are living with domestic abuse by advising on tenancy matters, including occupation orders and ways to make your own home safer to remain in. We can provide a 'safe space' in our Cambourne office for residents who need to disclose domestic abuse and can accommodate requests for an adviser of a specific gender, particularly if we are made aware of this requirement in advance.

Anything you tell our colleagues will be treated with care and handled sensitively.

#WeSpeakUp – White Ribbon Day

Building on the strong foundations which earned our DAHA accreditation back in 2022, we also achieved White Ribbon UK accreditation. This supports us to engage men and boys to prevent violence against women and girls. Sexist jokes and 'banter' can contribute towards a culture of abuse against women and girls, and can often legitimise the behaviour of others who may end up committing serious acts of violence.

White Ribbon Day is marked annually on 25 November, and this year's theme - #WeSpeakUp - encouraged men to challenge harmful behaviours – whether that's calling out a sexist joke, stepping in when something's not right, or leading by example.

Everyone can speak up for change. Even the smallest of every day actions help make a difference both in and out of the workplace. Every time we ignore something that doesn't feel right, we miss a chance to set a better example.

This November, we've been encouraging conversations between our colleagues, and asked them to consider signing the White Ribbon Promise.

Being green to our core

Weekly food waste collections coming in 2026

Next year, all households in South Cambridgeshire are going to be getting a new weekly collection for their food waste.

This change comes as part of Government rules requiring all councils to collect food waste separately - helping to boost recycling rates and reduce the amount of food sent to landfill.

Recent analysis of black bin contents revealed that around 35% was food, much of which could have been eaten if it had been used in time. Weekly food waste collections have been shown to increase recycling by making it easier and cleaner.

What to expect

Every household will receive a small kitchen caddy to collect food waste, and a starter roll of liners. If you live in a house, you'll also get a larger outdoor caddy to place at the kerbside each week on the same day as your other bins are emptied. Residents in flats will receive a shared wheelie bin located with their other shared bins.

You'll be able to recycle all types of food waste from vegetable peelings and tea bags to meat, bones and leftovers. The collected waste will be sent to an anaerobic digestion (AD) facility, where it will be used to generate electricity to power UK homes.

The liners provided are plastic, but they are removed during the first stage of the AD process. Once your starter roll runs out, you can use a see-through plastic bag, paper liners, compostable-plastic ones, or none if you prefer.

When will it start?

The service will be rolled out in phases throughout 2026 in January, April, June and September to allow time for us to buy new bin lorries, provide you with caddies and recruit more bin crews.

We'll write to each household six weeks before your start date with full details. This letter will include your first collection date and when to expect your caddy or caddies, liners, and an information leaflet.

Reducing food waste

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Environment, Cllr Natalie Warren-Green, said: *“This isn’t just about recycling food waste, it’s also a chance to reflect on how much food we throw away. The average UK household throws away the equivalent of 140 meals a year, costing around £470. The energy wasted growing that food produces carbon dioxide emissions that contribute to climate change, adding to the emissions released by food waste in landfill.”*

Simple tips to waste less:

- Freeze food (where possible) to extend its life.
- Buy loose produce and only what you need.
- Measure portions before cooking.
- Plan meals and shop with a list.
- Store fruit and veg in the fridge below 5°C.
- Understand food labels - ‘Best before’ is about quality, ‘use by’ is about safety.
- Use up leftovers within two days and reheat until piping hot.

If you're hosting, why not get ahead with Christmas dinner and prep everything now? Influencers like The Batch Lady and The Full Freezer have had their Christmas lunches in the freezer for weeks already, and this is one trend we are keen on. Getting organised like this means less chance of food being wasted, and more chance of putting your feet up on the big day!

Choose loose

Avoid buying plastic bags of veg in the supermarket and choose loose instead. It's not just the packaging - research shows that if we switched to buying apples, potatoes and bananas loose, 8.2 million shopping baskets worth of food waste could be prevented every year, because we'd only buy what we need.

Recycle right

If you'll be away, check the recycling rules where you're staying, as they might be different from at home. You can always find this information on the local council's website for that area. And if you have guests staying with you then let them know where and what to recycle in your home.

The hidden cost of cosy: Rethinking log burners

There's something undeniably comforting about the crackle of a fire on a cold winter's night.

In the UK, that sentiment has translated into a surge in log burner sales over the past ten years. But beneath the warm glow lies a growing concern - one that's impacting both our health and the environment.

The Government have already put into place the 'Ready to Burn' scheme to help people find the cleanest fuels for burning at home. We support this national guidance and so wanted to remind you about the dangers of burning and how to burn responsibly. Many users remain unaware of the pollutants log burners release, particularly PM2.5, a microscopic particulate matter so small, it enters the bloodstream when you breathe it in.

As stated in the Chief Medical Officer's Report 2022, air pollution has been linked with a range of serious conditions: lung cancer, cardiovascular and respiratory diseases, diabetes, and even cognitive decline leading to dementia. It's not just the person lighting the fire who's at risk - neighbours and passersby are affected too.

Beyond health, there are also environmental impacts associated with burning wood. When wood is burned, the carbon dioxide that was stored in the trees is released in just a few minutes. It can take years, decades or even a century for a new tree to absorb the same amount of carbon as is released, and in the meantime the atmospheric carbon released contributes to climate change.

If you don't rely on your log burner or open fire as a primary heat source, consider skipping it this winter. There are safer, more sustainable ways to stay warm:

- **Layer up:** Thermal clothing and blankets can go a long way.
- **Targeted heating:** Warm only the rooms you're using.
- **Hot water bottles:** A classic comfort with zero emissions.

However, we know this is not a choice for everyone. If you do need to use your log burner to keep warm this winter, then please consider these tips:

- **Maintain your burner and chimney:** Regular cleaning improves efficiency and reduces harmful emissions.
- **Use dry wood:** Look for the Ready to Burn logo to ensure moisture content is low.
- **Don't over stock the fire:** People often add more wood, even though the heat lasts for hours after the flames fade.
- **Install a stove pipe thermometer:** To monitor optimal burning.
- **Install a heat powered stove fan:** To circulate the warm air into the room.
- **Burn clean:** Never throw rubbish or non-wood materials into the fire.

These small changes can make a big difference in reducing harm while keeping your home warm.

Being green to our core

Turning sunlight into savings in South Cambridgeshire

In the UK, renewable energy accounts for around 40% of energy produced, with wind energy making up more than half of all renewable sources, according to latest figures.

Surprisingly, solar accounts for only 4.7%, a supply which fluctuates depending on the amount of sunlight throughout the seasons.

In South Cambridgeshire, we receive an impressive 1,500 hours of sunlight throughout the year which can be converted into electricity - even on a small scale.

We have been supporting communities to switch to renewable energy through our Zero Carbon Communities (ZCC) Grant scheme, which has helped village halls and community spaces install solar panels to generate their own renewable energy, reduce carbon emissions, and significantly cut their energy bills.

- Cottenham Village Hall installed a 30 panel 13.05kWp solar system with a 10kWh storage battery, which generates about 47% of energy needed and saved £1,200 in the initial three months after installation.
- Wysing Arts Centre installed 32 solar panels and a battery, generating 1,360 kWh, in the first three weeks. That's enough to power around 136 homes for a day - and saving 0.65 tonnes of carbon.
- Balsham Village Hall installed 12 solar panels and a 10kWh storage battery, which reduced their electricity bill by 40% during the winter months after installation.
- Caxton Parish Council installed 32 solar panels in an 8kWp system with a 13kWh battery, and generated 300kWh of electricity in the month of February, about 40% of total electricity consumed.
- Kingston Village Hall installed 16 solar panels and 5.8kWh batteries and have reduced their electricity bill to nearly zero since installation.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Environment, Cllr Natalie Warren- Green, said: *"We're proud to support local action that brings lasting environmental and financial benefits. It's inspiring to see village halls and community spaces engaged in the solar revolution. As well as helping to generate more renewable energy, we have also supported projects that help cut down energy consumption in other ways, for example, by switching to LED lighting, or insulating walls, doors and windows to keep heat in."*

Interested in helping your community cut carbon and cut costs? Here's what you'll need to provide for a ZCC grant application:

- Expert advice on what measures to install – like an energy survey.
- Three quotes. This is key for making sure you are getting best value for money.
- Calculation of the expected carbon savings from your project. This is often provided as part of quotes.
- An idea of how you will communicate the wider benefits to the community.

The next round of applications for our ZCC grants will open in spring 2026.

Creating healthier and safer journeys

As we approach the end of 2025, we're taking stock of the progress made in delivering the Greater Cambridge Partnership's (GCP) network of 12 walking, cycling, and wheeling routes - which are designed to provide safer and more accessible routes for everyone.

So far, communities along the Melbourn, Horningsea, Comberton, Linton, Sawston, and Waterbeach Greenways have seen improvements to everyday journeys through better lighting, wider paths, traffic calming measures, safer crossings, new surfaces, and upgraded traffic signals.

Let's start with the Barton Greenway, which will connect Barton village to Cambridge. Journeys to places like Barton Primary School and Burwash Manor are set to become safer and more reliable.

In Barton, the team is completing new crossings, widening paths, and improving lighting - enhancing travel within the village and its connections to the surrounding area.

Work on Barton Road includes widening the walking and cycling path, improving drainage, and creating clearer separation between the path and the road. These upgrades will make the route safer and more usable throughout the year.

Next on the list is the Comberton Greenway, which will connect Comberton, Hardwick, Coton, and Cambridge. Places like Cambridge West, the Sidgwick Site, Newnham, Comberton Village College, and Long Road Sixth Form College will become easier to access by walking and cycling.

As part of the Comberton Greenway, improvements in Coton village include upgraded footpaths and junctions, enhanced lighting, resurfaced roads and paths, and measures to reduce vehicle speeds.

Meanwhile, Adams Road in Cambridge is becoming England's first 'Cycle Street'. A Cycle Street is designed to give priority to cyclists while continuing to share the space with other road users.

Looking ahead to 2026, further improvements are planned to create wider paths and reduce vehicle speeds in the villages of Shepreth, Stapleford, and Great Shelford - making journeys safer for people walking, cycling, and wheeling.

This includes a network of 12 walking, cycling, and wheeling routes across Greater Cambridge - known as the Greenways. Building safer communities through partnership

The South Cambs Community Safety Partnership - which we are a part of - works on the principle that no single agency can address all causes of crime and antisocial behaviour, and that effective partnership working is vital.

We work with Cambridgeshire County Council, Cambridgeshire Constabulary, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service, the Integrated Care System, the Probation Service, and the Voluntary and Community Sector.

The focus areas for the South Cambs Community Safety Partnership are shaped by data and community feedback. The partnership uses the Police's Community Policing survey to understand residents' concerns. This year the Neighbourhood Policing Team's priorities have included:

Antisocial behaviour and antisocial driving

Antisocial behaviour affects how safe and comfortable we feel in our own homes and communities. Antisocial behaviour can refer to lots of things. It could be groups of people making a lot of noise, trying to intimidate others or damaging equipment. It may be loud or reckless driving - especially at night. It could also neighbour disputes, flytipping, uncontrolled animals and more.

Reports about days and times of repeated antisocial behaviour can help Police to plan patrols. As a partnership, we can use a wider selection of response and prevention options, including how we can work with communities to build resilience and spread awareness.

Drugs

Drug use and dealing can overlap with antisocial behaviour. Residents may notice signs such as frequent visits to certain locations or indicators of cannabis farms. These reports can support police and also trigger safeguarding responses from other agencies.

Knife carrying

Knife carrying worries residents, though South Cambridgeshire has low levels of knife crime. The Community Safety Partnership delivers education sessions with the police in schools and youth groups, helping young people understand the consequences of breaking the law – on themselves, victims, on families and friends, and on their future prospects. Families are a vital partner in helping young people interpret media and peer influences.

Celebrating a special place for older people in South Cambridgeshire

Over Day Centre is a friendly and caring place where older people from 17 villages across South

Cambridgeshire come to spend time, have fun, and get support.

Every week, 48 clients visit the Centre on one or more days. They can be picked up and dropped off by a free minibus service, making it easy for them to join in.

The Centre helps people stay active, independent, and connected to their communities. It also gives families a break from looking after loved ones every day, which can be tiring.

The story of Over Day Centre began in September 1989. Back then, it was just a small meeting place in a temporary portable building. Now, nearly 36 years later, it has grown into a modern care centre with lots of space and activities.

Each day, trained carers run fun and interesting events like games, music, dancing, gardening, poetry, and even visits from animals! There are also trips to farms, museums, and tea rooms. A tasty two-course lunch is cooked fresh every day, and there's always tea and coffee too.

The Centre has a salon, a podiatrist who looks after feet and an assisted bathing facility to allow clients to enjoy a warm soak. The garden has been designed with accessibility in mind, with raised beds and seating so everyone can enjoy the outdoors.

In addition, Over Day Centre is raising money for big improvements. They want to buy a new minibus, decorate the building, add a fresh air ventilation system, and furnish a new day room. These changes will help make the Centre even more welcoming.

We have helped too. In 2024, the Centre received £10,000 through one of our Zero Carbon Communities grants to install solar panels and batteries, helping the environment and reducing energy bills. In September 2025, they were awarded more than £1,700 from our Community Chest grant fund to buy electric awnings. These give shade and shelter so people can enjoy the garden in all kinds of weather.

Over £2.4 million in local grants support communities

Through our various grant schemes and working with partners, we awarded almost 160 grants to local groups, businesses and projects during the last year.

These included:

- Service Support Grants (£181,650) to help people stay healthy and safe.
- Mobile Warden Scheme Grants (£105,908) to support older and vulnerable residents.
- Zero Carbon Communities Grants (£122,500) to help protect the environment.
- Community Chest Grants (£64,178) for small but important community projects.
- Other smaller grants like Tenant Community Grants, Long-Term Health Conditions Grants, and the Six Free Trees scheme, which gave away trees to 47 parish and town councils.

We also worked with our partners to give out 82 more grants, using extra funding from the Government and other organisations such as the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority. These grants helped improve high streets, support small businesses, and make communities stronger.

Some of the biggest partner-funded grants included:

- £876,101 from the Rural England Prosperity Fund to support rural areas.
- £230,000 to improve high streets.
- £115,000 for green business projects.

- £377,043 for Net Zero Villages, helping communities become more eco-friendly.

We also helped fund services like Community Hubs, falls prevention, and employment support, using money from health and care partners including the Integrated Care System and Cambridgeshire County Council. These services help people stay healthy and connected.

In addition, we helped bring in more than £36,000 from Sport England to improve energy use at Melbourn Swimming Pool. This included new steps, a pool cover, and a heat exchange unit.

We helped fund community safety projects with nearly £20,000 in grants. This included £16,500 to support young people and over £2,000 for CCTV cameras to help keep public spaces safe, including Milton Country Park. The funding came from the Police and Crime Commissioner and helps make our communities safer for everyone.

All these grants and services align with our Corporate Plan priorities, which form the sections of your magazine and are:

Local government reorganisation update

A recent survey that we conducted jointly with Cambridge City Council revealed strong public support for the creation of a new unitary Council for the Greater Cambridge area.

Of the 889 residents who responded to the questionnaire, 69% said they “support” or “strongly support” the idea of a single Council covering Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire.

The survey, which ran in September and October, was launched in response to the Government's plans to reorganise local government structures across England. These plans will replace the current two-tier system - where services are split between district/city and county councils - with fewer, more streamlined unitary authorities by April 2028.

Under the changes, all local services such as bins, education, planning, roads maintenance and social care will be delivered by one Council, rather than being divided between different tiers.

A proposed Greater Cambridge unitary council – which is one of several options being developed by local councils - would cover the existing boundaries of South Cambridgeshire District and Cambridge City councils.

The other options being considered include one that would see South Cambridgeshire join with Cambridge and East Cambridgeshire, and another that would see our district join with Cambridge and Huntingdonshire.

The proposal for a unitary Council for South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge is seen as beneficial for South Cambridgeshire because it would:

- Improve services by building on existing joint working arrangements.
- Align closely with the area's economic geography, particularly its role as a leading science and technology hub.
- Provide better value for money and reduce duplication.
- Respect historic identities.

Council Leader, Cllr Bridget Smith, said: *“There are many compelling arguments for this footprint, and we're grateful to everyone who took the time to share their views. Ultimately, the Government will decide which local government structures to put in place – but it is clear there is significant local support for a new unitary council for South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge.”*

Our District Councillors were meeting on 24 November – which was after your South Cambs Magazine went to print - to agree which preferred option we will submit to the Government.

There will be consultation by Government in 2026, before they ultimately make a final decision. New unitary councils are then due to begin operating in a shadow capacity from May 2027, with full implementation expected in April 2028.
