(A) BUILDINGS THAT SHOULD BE OFFICIALLY LISTED



HISTON, 9 CHURCH STREET, VICTORIAN SLAUGHTER HOUSE

The Victorian slaughter house plus bullock lean-to. Part of the premises of Yew Cottage, 9 Church Street, built by the Papworth family in the mid C19 when they were well-known farmers and butchers.

It comprises a steep pitched gabled wing with a loading door in the east gable and twin access doors at ground floor for removing the carcasses, plus a lean-to annexe where younger animals were kept before slaughter, known as the bullock house. The beech pulley wheels for the ropes still survive attached to the cross beams.

HISTON, 10 CHURCH STREET, BELL COTTAGE AND

FORMER BLACKSMITH'S FORGE

An early thatched one and a half storey local style cottage. Set back in the garden is a red tiled building surviving as a blacksmith's forge until the 1960s.

HISTON, 1 HIGH STREET, THE BREWHOUSE AT THE BOOT

The detached two storey building with pantiled roof standing at the rear of the yard was built in the C19 as a brewhouse and has seen many changes of use since. It has sash windows and shows a panel of feather-edged boarding, plus a date of 1882 with the initials HP – this may have referred to a later alteration.

HISTON, 7 HIGH STREET, THE BARLEY MOW

The square two storey slate roofed main building has curved, bracketed moulded brick eaves from around 1850 and central mullioned windows. The lower range to the south, with steep-pitched gables, is rather older with maybe early C18 enclosed beams on the ground floor.

HISTON, 25 HIGH STREET, WALL OF THE GARDEN OF THE GABLES

The wall to the High Street, south of the house, contains materials up to 400 years old including eroded blocks of local clunch, that probably came from the demolished St Etheldreda's church, Histon. The wall was clearly raised probably in the C19 when the new range to the house was added.

HISTON, 3 NARROW LANE, VIOLET COTTAGE

A handsome example of a detached local C17 thatched cottage with a cross wing to the rear. Home of the Franks family from 1800 – c.1910.

HISTON, 14 SCHOOL HILL, BROOK HOUSE

Formerly Brook Lodge. Classic 1849 late Georgian style tenant gentleman farmer's house.

Eaves with moulded brick decorative brackets. Sash windows with central glazing mullions and stone lintels. Ground floor raised four steps to counter local flooding, allowing a wine cellar beneath the entrance hall.
